## WHO WE ARE

## THE PROBLEM

Like every city in America, we have significant numbers of residents who are experiencing homelessness in one form or another.

 As of August 2022, the New Mexico Coalition to End Homelessness Coordinated Entry System (which is not yet tracking all homeless people in Santa Fe), recorded a total of 363 individuals, 49 families, and 18 homeless youth in Santa Fe, with 205 individuals being chronically homeless, 22 being chronically homeless veterans, and a disproportionate number of Native American and African American people experiencing homelessness.

We have inadequate affordable housing units and supportive services, including behavioral health supports.

We need better data to further inform system development.

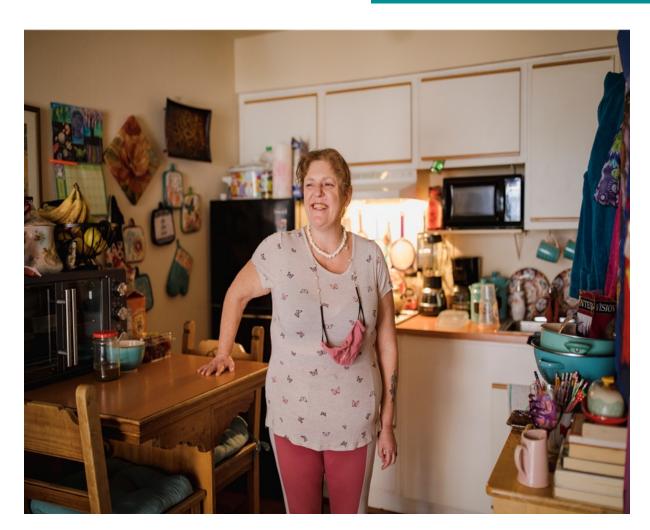
**Homelessness is not a crime.** However, residents and business owners express they are bearing the brunt of the impact that people experiencing homelessness have on our community.

- Over 80 encampments reported this summer.
- \$3.4 million spent on encampment enforcement and cleanup prior to pandemic.
- Police estimate that between 30-40% of all calls are homeless related.

## GENERAL SOLUTIONS FOR ENDING HOMELESSNESS



Build affordable housing and ensure livable wages for the Santa Fe workforce.

#### Provide:

- Income support
- Life skills and rehabilitation
- Crisis management (for physical & behavioral health crises, eviction, etc.)
- Emergency support services
- Temporary shelter
- Supportive housing with wrap-around services

#### TYPES OF HOMELESSNESS

#### HIDDEN HOMELESSNESS

The hidden homeless are people who access accommodation, though have no immediate prospect of permanent or stable housing. Includes individuals who may be "couch surfing" or temporarily staying with friends or family.





#### SITUATIONAL HOMELESSNESS

Common causes include job loss, a healthcare emergency (which may lead to job loss or overwhelming medical bills), divorce, domestic abuse, fire, and natural disasters.

These individuals are referred to as "situationally" or "temporarily" homeless which generally means that they have lived in stable housing without supports in the past and can do so again once a specific situation in their life is addressed.

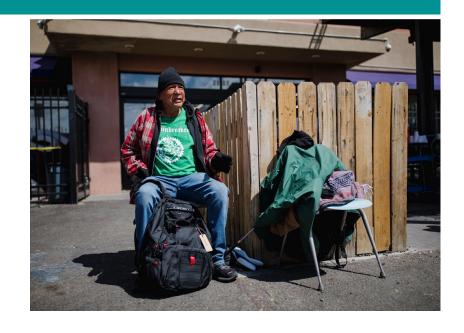


### TYPES OF HOMELESSNESS

#### **EPISODIC HOMELESSNESS**

Episodically homeless refers to individuals, often with disabling conditions, who are currently homeless and have experienced three or more episodes of homelessness in the past year.

Among individuals in this group, jobs are less stable, housing costs consume a higher percentage of the household budget, and they have little or no financial buffers against emergencies.





#### **CHRONIC HOMELESSNESS**

An individual experiencing chronic homelessness is someone who has experienced homelessness for a year or longer, or who has experienced at least four episodes of homelessness in the last three years (must be a cumulative of 12 months) and has a disability.

Psychiatric diagnosis, substance use disorders, and medical comorbidities are more prevalent within chronically homeless populations.



### OUR SIX GOAL AREAS

- 1. PRESERVATION AND PREVENTION: Increase resources and develop strategies to prevent homelessness, including the preservation of existing affordable housing and enhanced utilization of social services; increased financial supports, such as the City and County Affordable Housing Trust Funds, to prevent homelessness and stabilize those who are precariously housed; and support for local regulation and land use policy changes that increase housing stability for residents.
- 2. <u>EMERGENCY SHELTER</u>: Create and further develop collective community agreements specific to emergency shelter provision, including expanding options for emergency shelter care to include safe and legal outdoor sleeping spaces and non-congregate shelter and improving shelter access to housing and supportive service resources.
- 3. <u>BUILDINGS/HOUSING UNITS</u>: Quantify the need for additional affordable units and, through new construction, conversion, subsidization, and redevelopment, increase the local affordable housing stock inventory with a goal of at least 100-200 units per year.



## SIX GOAL AREAS

- 4. <u>INDIVIDUAL VOUCHERS/PROGRAM BASED VOUCHERS</u>: Increase funding for housing vouchers, both short- and long-term, and develop strategies to ensure that those vouchers can be flexibly utilized in ways that promote equity and housing choice; and ensure that existing voucher programs are expended in full.
- 5. <u>SUPPORTIVE SERVICES</u>: Ensure all interested individuals and families participating in housing programs have high-quality crisis intervention, behavioral healthcare, and other supportive services to maintain safe housing.
- 6. **SYSTEM INFRASTRUCTURE**: Continue development of the community-wide homeless response system, which includes strategic planning and clarifying the roles, function, and authority of each partner. The system development will include collective identification of system gaps through collecting accurate data, creation of cooperative strategies to address gaps, and consistent cross-agency communication on funding opportunities, housing initiatives, and overall system development.



## PROGRESS TOWARD GOALS

#### PRESERVATION AND PREVENTION:

- Santa Fe CONNECT Program provided multiple hundreds of people with support to maintain housing
- \$2 million committed from City of Santa Fe for eviction prevention in 2022-2025

#### **EMERGENCY SHELTER:**

- Consuelo's Place at Midtown Campus noncongregate shelter for 60+ households at any given time (25% of total guests sheltered have been permanently housed)
- Emergency shelter in hotel/motel rooms to over 400 individuals during pandemic

#### **BUILDINGS/HOUSING UNITS:**

- Santa Fe Suites permanent housing for 120+ households
- Lamplighter Inn permanent housing for 58 households (available in 2023)
- Landlord Liaison position to improve local landlord engagement

#### **INDIVIDUAL VOUCHERS/PROGRAM BASED VOUCHERS:**

 Distribution of more than 150 housing vouchers for homeless/precariously housed (includes chronic, veterans, individuals and families)

#### **SUPPORTIVE SERVICES:**

- La Sala Behavioral Health Crisis Triage Center/Mobile BH Crisis Unit assists people in crisis – walk-ins & referrals
- Alternative Response Unit (ARU) assists people in crisis via 911, many unsheltered

#### **SYSTEM INFRASTRUCTURE:**

- National Built for Zero Initiative achieving quality data
- Multiple cross-agency/cross-funder working groups
- Landlord Liaison position to improve local landlord engagement
- Joint resolution on homelessness between City of Santa Fe and Santa Fe County



### GOALS IN THE WORKS

- Enforce "no camping" ordinance
- Expand mobile outreach services & implementation of mobile hygiene unit
- Purchase another motel for conversion to non-congregate shelter and housing
- Expand day shelter services
- Develop cross-agency mobile team to provide home-based supportive services to support households to maintain housing
- Develop a local Lived Experience Advisory Board (LEAB) to include the voice of people who have experienced homelessness in all areas of system development
- Create more affordable housing, to include set-asides of units for special needs households
- Implement a managed camp/"Safe Outdoor Space"



## MANAGED ENCAMPMENTS SAFE OUTDOOR SPACES

- Quick and effective way to shelter then house a variety of people
- Commitment to neighborhood safety
- Housing first, resource rich model
- Trauma informed
- Individualized shelters
- Access to electricity and hygiene stations
- 24-hour staffing, with at least two staff members on site
